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## Pou rāhui erected to restore mauri of taonga

**On Friday the 19th April, the iwi of Ngātiwai came together before dawn to support the whānau and hapū of Matapouri, Te Whānau a Rangiwhakāhu, in erecting a pou rāhui at the base of Rangitapu (The Headland) and Te Wai O Taniwha (The Mermaid Pools).**

The official pānui had notified that the pou ceremony would happen at 5am, but due to a full moon and king tides the hapū decided that the kaupapa for the pou had to happen earlier or they risked not being able to walk around to Te Kohanga Bay (the bay at the base of Rangitapu) due to the unusually high tide, some suggesting the pou was already giving a tohu or a sign of its impending rāhui.

So whānau, kaumātua, tamariki, members of the local community, representatives from the Department of Conservation and Whangārei District Council made their way to the site of the pou just after 4am, wading through waters already above their knees, but this was not going to deter those who have been passionate about this kaupapa for a long time.

A Karakia was held at the site, with all those in attendance calling the name of the pou three times when summoned - "Rangitapu, Rangitapu, Rangaitapu!!"

Te Whānau a Rangiwhakāhu hapū Chairman, Aperahama Edwards says, "It's been a long time coming but we have finally erected our pou rāhui."

"The pou are guardians of the Mermaid Pools."

"The pou is called Rangitapu and it's also the name of the area in which it stands. We've personified our kaitiaki taniwha within the pou, Tuatini and Mauri."

As those who gathered made their way back to the bay prior, the water was now well up to and above their waists. Children were hoist above parent's heads, camera and lighting gear held aloft to avoid being lost in the water, with only one report of a cellphone lost to the sea.

Back at the main beach a gathering had amassed who had expected the proceedings to begin at 5am. Rangitira Aperahama Edwards explained to all those that had gathered why the hapū had made the decision to go earlier due to the tide, but included everyone who gathered by completing the kaupapa for the pou Rangitapu from there.

After the ceremony, all those in attendance were welcomed back onto the marae for some shared kōrero about the pou and the significance of the sites and why they had to be closed.

With its raised profile by the likes of tourism websites Trip Advisor, Lonely Planet and features on the global giant National Geographic, it is little wonder that Te Wai O Taniwha, known around the world as "The Mermaid Pools" has seen foot traffic grow exponentially.

Matapouri local and member of Kapakaitiaki, Dorothy Waetford says, "Places like Lonely Planet, Trip Advisor and things like that - it would be really great if they came on board and sent our messages out. People are still welcome to come it's just that - Te Wai o Te Taniwha or Mermaid Pools needs time to rest, to recover."

Many years ago, access to the pools was around the base of the headland Rangitapu, never over the top. In those times you would have to shimmy along ledges and go through a hole in a rock to get there. But possibly as a tohu, the hole through the rock collapsed closing the access way (by foot) to the pools.

But as the pools even by this stage had already become popular, some visitors decided to make a new track over the headland Rangitapu. As the name would suggest, this headland is a very sacred and culturally significant site to the whānau and hapū of Matapouri, and over the years local kaumātua and whānau have never been happy about the creation of this track.

Over time and as a consequence of its now global profile, Rangitapu and Te Wai O Taniwha have taken a pummelling. At its peak during summer, local whānau monitoring their taonga counted approximately 500 people visiting the pools in one day.

With no toilets or rubbish bins, Rangitapu and Te Wai O Taniwha have been desecrated with rubbish, human excrement, sanitary items and nappies.

The impact of people taking a mimi in the pools and wearing sunscreen has seen the rocks below the surface of the pools once coloured pink are now tinged brown.

There is long green algae floating, crusty brown sludge on rock surfaces below the water and transparent slick on the water surface in some places. The pools and the surrounding areas of recent times have been known to smell of urine.

At the completion of all the kaupapa a breakfast hakari was held at the marae, and everyone enjoyed a hearty cooked meal put on by whānau. After such an early start, everyone was ready for the kai that was eagerly devoured by all.

Aperahama Edwards says, "I mihi to our iwi, kaumātua, hapū & whanāu who came to tautoko this special kaupapa. We acknowledge our community who are here with us today who have supported us right through and continue to support.

"I want to make a special acknowledgement to the Tai Tokerau Maori Artists Collective and Kapakaitiaki who raised the profile of the plight of Te Wai O Taniwha."

"E kore hoki e mutu ngā mihi ki a Rua Paul kua awhi mai I ana huanga o Te Whānau a Rangiwhakāhu otira a Ngātiwai nui tonu mai rano I roto I enei tumomo mahi. He pera ano te mihi ki to tatou tohunga a Te Warihi Hetaraka."

Aperahama advises that the rāhui will remain until the hapū are confident the mauri of the Rangitapu and Te Wai O Taniwha has returned and that they are shown to be in a healthy state.

# Rescued turtles released in Ngātiwai rohe

Earlier in March, Ngātiwai were invited to tautoko the release of three rehabilitated turtles at Aorangi - The Poor Knights. These turtles have been nurtured back to health by the team from Auckland's Sea Life Kelly Tarlton's.

The turtles were all brought to Kelly Tarlton's after either being sick or injured in their natural wild habitat, and without the help and intervention of the Team from Kelly Tarlton's over the past twelve months, they probably would not have survived.

SEA LIFE Kelly Tarlton's is actively involved in rescuing and rehabilitating injured, stranded or sick turtles found or brought to them. Once brought back to health the turtles are then tagged and released back into the wild.

Turtles and other sea life are facing unprecedented threats in the wild and swim through loads of risks just trying to survive. Fishing nets, plastic pollution, boat strikes, habitat loss, and coastal development are individually and cumulatively impacting upon turtle numbers around the world, and Kelly Tarlton's are playing their part in the conservation of these wonderful creatures and were delighted to be able to release these three turtles in the Ngātiwai rohe.

The team became so close to these turtles over the twelve months, they referred to them as their beautiful beloveds and

gave them the names Connie, Toby and Jaxon.

Ngātiwai uri Kawiti Waetford said "It's awesome to see the turtles, other species of fish and our kids swimming together, having that connection with Tangaroa and hinemoana."

Ngātawai rangatahi, Te Rangitūkiwaho Edwards said, "This is the first time I've seen turtles released into the ocean. It's awesome to see whānau and organisations coming together to support this important programme."

It was a beautiful day on the water, with near perfect conditions for the release.

Alyssa Berimballi Aquarist from Sea Life Kelly Tarlton's said, "Ultimately it's our goal to get them back to being a nice healthy fit turtle."

"Most turtles that come to us are really under weight and really struggling." "We thank Ngātiwai for all their support today, and for allowing us to release these Turtles back into their habitat at the Poor Knights."

Ngātiwai Trustee, Aperahama Edwards said, "This has been incredible to be a part of and a privilege for us as Ngātiwai to see these taonga once again amongst our taio."



This is Toby. Rescued from just outside of Whangārei, Toby is a green sea turtle. Despite his small size, the team said he is packed full of attitude and spends most of his time scratching his back on his favourite rock.



This is Connie. Connie made a remarkable recovery during her time at Kelly Tarlton's with issues around digestion and oedema. The team said that within 24 hours of being in Turtle Bay, the green sea turtle rearranged everything possible in an attempt to find the perfect shell scratcher and now weighs a whopping 24kgs.



This is Jaxon. Jaxon is a loggerhead turtle who was rescued at 90 Mile Beach with a severe lung infection. He arrived at Kelly Tarlton's in an ice-cream container weighing a tiny 1.89kg. After several weeks of treatment, the team said he was back to his sweet self and eating like it was going out of fashion - now weighing a healthy 7.32kg.

# Ngatiwai kāhui kaumātua update

## Summary of recommendations/ outcomes from the kāhui kaumātua hui held 29th March 2019 at Paratene Te Manu Marae, Ngunguru

### Constitution

After a number of years in 'review' the recommendation is that an entirely new constitution be developed; and that the role of the kaumātua 'to maintain the cultural and spiritual integrity' of the iwi be reflected accordingly.

### Naming of a new species

Kaumātua to consider a name for a new species of 'seahorse' discovered in Ngātiwai waters. More details to come.

### Ngātiwai Festival

That an inaugural Tūkaiaia Festival be held December 2019. That the festival be lead by the younger generation and supported by the Kāhui kaumātua

### Ngātiwai Kaumātua Awards

That the inaugural (kaumātua led) Tūkaiaia Awards be held (first week of) December 2019 and that this be a formal award's evening (banquet and entertainment) recognising Ngātiwai successes.

Hapū to be invited to donate trophies. Kaumātua and finalists will be free, and ticket sales for others.

### Hikoī Tūkaiaia

That the inaugural kaumātua Tūkaiaia Hikoī 2020 be held (end of March 2020,) travelling by bus and boat to the significant sites of Ngātiwai. That the stories be shared and a pictorial record be developed. Option for the creation of calendars and a book. Proceeds to go towards future kaumātua hikoī. Potential for Annual Hikoī book series.

### Hui-A-Iwi

That hui be held for whānau to express their aspirations for the future of Ngātiwai.

### Self-reliance

Self-reliance is a key theme. Proceeds from a 'basket social,' fundraiser (date tbc) will go towards supporting kaumātua.

### Kaumātua work streams

Work streams are being formed based on key interests/knowledge of kaumātua: Environment, Treaty, Education, Health, Kapa Haka, Music, Te Reo etc. Updates to be given at the bi monthly meetings

Kaumātua awards work stream established: Logistics – A. Moore ; Sponsorship/Funds - C. Moore; Catering - K. Caldwell, T. McLeod; Programme/Entertainment - T. Barber, E. Reti; Awards - D and H. Rapata, S. Rata

### Travel support

Travel support by way of vouchers is to be budgeted for attendance at kaumātua meetings, events.

### Hui with Ngāpuhi Kaumātua

On Tuesday the 30th of April, the Ngātiwai kāhui kaumātua hosted a delegation of Ngāpuhi kaumātua at their monthly meeting to discuss common interests.

While very brief Ngātiwai kaumātua outlined a raft of issues that they were concerned about such as the Treaty settlement process, sovereignty, Wai 262 the flora and fauna claim, the Sealord Deal, Heritage New Zealand's treatment of wahitapu and pa sites, Department of Conservation's involvement in Kauri Dieback, the Mandate reports for both Ngāpuhi and Ngātiwai and Hauraki Overlapping Claims. There were discussions about common concerns such as ensuring kaumātua are not used as a tick box or an ornamental tekoteko.

The Ngāpuhi kaumātua outlined how they are arranged on a representative basis with 9 members supported by a wider base of around 50 to 60 kaumātua who meet monthly. While they are not directly involved in Treaty Claims they have focused their efforts on holding wanānga to collect and share kōrero with such examples as wānanga on youth suicide, cremation, organ donation, marae protocols and what to do with ashes from overseas.

They have an annual budget but also do their own fundraising. They determine what they do and where they go within their budget but they also fund raise to help them attend events such as visiting Tahiti to see significant sites associated with their tupuna, visiting Sydney to mark 200 years of Māori in Paramata.

In summing up the Ngātiwai kaumātua kāhui secretary Pam Armstrong said, "we were very appreciative of Ngāpuhi kaumātua coming to visit today and to share their experiences. At a recent wanānga Ngātiwai kaumātua considered their role in relation to the Trust Board and recommended that a completely new constitution be developed."

It was also noted given recent events with the Hauraki overlapping claims inquiry and with Ngatiwai and Ngāpuhi yet to settle their own overlapping claims that building on the relation between the two groups at this early stage was going to be very important. Therefore, further hui are likely to be planed.

# MACA Inquiry Update

## MACA Stage 1 - Week 1 Hearings

This first week of the Marine and Coastal Area Act (MACA) Waitangi Tribunal hearings were held in Wellington from Monday 25th March to Friday 29th March 2019.

Ngātiwai were represented at these hearings by Treaty Claims Committee Chairman and Trustee for Matapouri – Aperahama Edwards, Treaty Claims Manager, Tania McPherson and our Legal Counsel, Stuart Henderson and Paula Wilson of Henderson Reeves, Whangarei. Our Ngātiwai whānau who presented their case at these hearings on behalf of their whānau and hāpu did a great job with their time in the witness stand, and upheld the mana of Ngātiwai proudly.

Ngātiwai were given the opportunity to present evidence on the Tuesday afternoon with Tania McPherson presenting our evidence with our legal counsel, and then continuing to stand to answer cross examination questions. The Ngātiwai evidence focused solely on the procedural and resourcing issues.

Ngātiwai presented very comprehensive evidence and this was acknowledged by the Tribunal panel, and also by Crown counsel and senior staff of Te Arawhiti (formerly known as the Office of Treaty Settlements).

The procedural and resourcing issues that Ngātiwai focused on became more evident as the week progressed. A high court registrar under cross examination conceded that the High Court was clearly not prepared for the tsunami of applications that they were to receive, they had little preparation, no practice notes or guidelines. They were challenged as to whether the Crown could and should have been better prepared given other large public interest proceedings they have previously been involved in.

Other procedural issues were uncovered with senior Te Arawhiti staff conceding under cross examination that they could have done better with communicating with the effected groups.

As a result of this Waitangi Tribunal Inquiry, Te Arawhiti will undertake a review of the funding amounts and policy for High Court applications, and will contact each of the High Court MACA applicants to participate in the process.

Treaty Claims Committee Chairman, Aperahama Edwards says, “It has been a long week, but I feel we presented our case with mana for all of Ngātiwai.”

“Our Treaty Claims Manager, Tania McPherson, did a great job answering questions accurately and succinctly during her time on the stand. She did brilliantly in representing this case for our iwi.”

“I would also like to acknowledge our legal team from Henderson Reeves. Paula Wilson and Stuart Henderson have been fantastic to work with, and presented our case professionally and totally on point, as acknowledged by the Tribunal and others.”

From here, dates for closing submissions for Stage 1 of the MACA Inquiry (WAI 2660) will be announced. Ngātiwai will shortly decide if we attend the hearings for closing submissions or whether we ask our legal team to present our closing submissions at the hearings on our behalf.

Aperahama says, “Being involved in these processes comes at huge cost and time. So the iwi will consider its next steps, while being mindful of how we best use our resources and manage costs.”

## WAI 2840: Hauraki Overlapping Claims Inquiry

While working through the MACA Stage 1 hearings, the Board was also preparing to appear again at the Waitangi Tribunal hearings from 8 - 12 April in Wellington. These hearings (WAI 2840) are an urgent inquiry into the Crown's Treaty Settlement policy regarding overlapping claims and the proposed redress in relation to the Hauraki Collective, Marutūāhu Collective and individual Hauraki iwi settlements.

A pōwhiri for the hearings took place on Sunday 7th April at Waiwhetu Marae, Lower Hutt and the hearings began on Monday 8th April.

The Board's representatives, witnesses and supporters including our whānau from Aotea, attended the hearings at Waiwhetu Marae in unison. Whānau based in Wellington also attended in support. Ngātiwai presented a very strong presence at the hearings together with Ngāti Manuhiri.

Kiri Tahana from Kahui Legal set the stage for Ngātiwai witnesses with compelling opening submissions. Ngātiwai Trustee for Matapouri Aperahama Edwards and Ngātiwai Chairman Haydn Edmonds were cross-examined and at the last minute the Crown and counsel for Hauraki chose not to cross-examine Ngātiwai Treaty Claims Manager Tania McPherson.

Treaty Claims Committee Chairman, Aperahama Edwards says, "It was great to have the Ngātiwai presence seen and heard, we really appreciated the tautoko from our whānau in Wellington and from across the motu that were able to attend."

"Going through these two hearings simultaneously has had huge impact on our Board and our wider iwi."

"The time, effort and costs that has gone into defending our Mana is huge, but we cannot sit back and watch our Mana Moana and Mana Whenua be given away by the Crown without anyone having a conversation with us on our marae first."

"So we had to travel, we had to fight this injustice and we had to defend the Mana of our people."

"We would like to thank Kiri and all the team from Kahui legal who presented our case so professionally and ensured that the mana of our iwi was upheld."

The timetable for the hearings was constantly changing up to and throughout the hearings but live-streaming links to the hearings were provided on a daily basis for claimants and was also screened at the Trust Board's offices.

Although the kaupapa was not a happy one feedback received included:

- Ngātiwai has the strongest case both in terms of poor Crown process and severity of redress, particularly on Aotea.
- Ngātiwai and Ngāti Manuhiri provided a united front with our legal counsels tag teaming in the cross-examination.
- The Crown admitted it had made a number of mistakes in relation to the Ngātiwai involvement in the overlapping claims processes.
- The Tribunal's questioning of the witnesses demonstrated it was alive to the Ngātiwai case.

Next steps:

- Claimants closing submissions are due on 8th May 2019
- Crown and interested parties closing submissions are due on 5th June 2019.
- Claimants reply submissions are then due on 17th June 2019.
- The Tribunal's report is likely to take several months to complete given the complexity of the claimant's cases.

Many overseas visitors like to meet locals while in New Zealand and restaurant management are keen to have trained New Zealand locals work in their restaurants.
